Join Tim Knox CVO FSA, Director of the Royal Collection, for a lively exploration of royal taste and patronage from Edward VII to Queen Elizabeth II. Beginning with Edward VII's penchant for white and gold dècors, Knox charts a century of collecting habits, from George V's passion for stamps to Queen Mary's refined eye for Fabergé and Chinese jades. Queen Elizabeth (the Queen Mother) embraced modern art, acquiring works by Sisley and Monet, while Queen

Elizabeth II, though personally understated, left a powerful legacy through the founding of the Royal Collection Trust. With wit and insight, Knox traces how the monarchy's varying appetites for art shaped—and safeguarded—one of the world's greatest collections.
